or 21 years, "Late Show" host David Letterman has presented night after night of Emmy Award-winning comedy, punctuated by drum rolls and rim shots from drummer Anton Fig. a member of the show's Orchestra since 1986. Fig has also

performed and recorded with Bob Dylan, Mick Jagger, Madonna, Kiss and Paul Simon, among others - including, most recently, Ambler recording artist Rick Denzien and Gwynedd Valley producer David Ivory. Denzien founded the Ambler-

based independent recording label Slot-1, and has three recording projects to his credit. He received a Billboard Songwriting Award with his second release, "Laser Writing on the Moon," and with

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his third CD release, "Exit 21" (1999), he was involved with the Grammy process and also mentioned as a "songwriting hero" under the subtitle "Reading the Grammy Tea Leaves" in the book "Songwriting for Dummies" by Joel Hirschhorn.

"Exit 21" received national airplay, Denzien went on tour, and also produced the local Songwriters Original Showcase, featuring up-and-coming regional artists.

"I felt that to grow as an artist, I needed to work with someone who could take me up a notch," said Denzien, "so I called David Ivory." A local producer, Grammy-nominated engineer and songwriter, Ivory is known for developing artists' music to a successful commercial level.

Ivory's work includes an impressive list of clients and artists, including Patty LaBelle, the O'Jays, Clive Davis of Jay Records for the Philadelphia band Silvertide, and the Grammy Award-winning Philadelphia hiphop band The Roots (Best Rap Album 1999), for which Ivory recorded and developed the sound

and received his Grammy nomination. His own songs have

been recorded by national label artists and have been heard on film and television.

"I work with artists who have the talent, ability and willingness to grow and who

have dedication to work hard to be successful," said Ivory. He equates his role in the studio with that of a professional sports coach. "My

Denzien began working with Ivory in 2003 at Dylanava Studio, which hosts artists from around the world. Located on three acres in Gwynedd Valley, the studio is devoid of "the distractions of a major metropolis." Denzien contacted Fig when


